G'Day & Welcome from the Division of Residential Services (DRS)

Congratulations! You've been accepted into one of the student residences at La Trobe University. There is now some important information that you need to know when you arrive in Australia.

If you arrive during office hours (9—5:00pm Monday—Friday), please make your way to the DRS Administration at Menzies College, where the Residential Services Officer (RSO) will be able to provide you with keys and show you to your room.

If you arrive out of office hours (any other time than those listed above, including weekends), please contact the after-hours contact number listed on page 5 of this guide. The Residential Assistant (RA) on duty will be able to meet you at the office and provide a warm welcome and show you to your room.

If you arrive after hours (after 5pm) at the Bundoora campus, you will need to ensure that you get dropped off at your student residence. Chisholm, Glenn and Menzies Colleges are all located inside La Trobe and Graduate House and University Lodge are located very close on the outskirts (a five minute walk from campus).

Do remember that your room will be a very plain and empty space when you first arrive, but we encourage you to make your room your own by adding posters and photos to brighten the area. You may also notice that there are not many students around the campus when you first check-in. This is because the academic semester hasn't yet started and many students won't move back in until mid July. Don't worry however, we always ask our international students to arrive early so that they can acclimatise to the campus and so that we can schedule a vast array of exciting and fun activities specifically designed to get you out and about around Melbourne and meeting new people (internationals and local Australians).

Please do remember that if you have concerns or questions at any time during your stay in the student residences, you are more than welcome to stop by the Central Administration Office located at Menzies College.

If you are interested in doing some travelling or exploring on your own, the Centre for Residential Life, CRL (next to the Menzies Office) has a fantastic collection of guide books and travel information on Melbourne and Australia, and you are most welcome to stop by and have a browse.

Travelling by Tram

Route 86: Telstra Dome, City – Bundoora/RMIT

Tram 86 runs directly from the Harbour Esplanade in Docklands (near the Telstra Dome), along Bourke St, via Southern Cross (previously Spencer Street) Station, through the city. The closest stop to the university is on Plenty road.

Late Night Travelling on the Weekend

958 - NightRider - City - Eltham via Smith Street, Darebin Road If you're stuck out in the City after having a late night and you don't want to pay for a taxi home, the NightRider buses operate, departing from Swanston Street (between Flinders and Collins Streets) every hour between 12.30 am and 4.30 am on Saturday and Sunday mornings.

BE SURE to catch the <u>958 service - (City - Eltham via Smith Street,</u> <u>Darebin Road)</u>, otherwise you will find yourselves on the opposite sides of Melbourne.

The **La Trobe Tram Stop is a Boundary Overlap**. So when travelling to the city purchase a zone 1, if you travel towards RMIT Bundoora then purchase a zone 2.

Academic Assistance

All the colleges within the DRS are academic colleges and have programs in place to help you achieve your potential. For first year students we have a team of Study Mentors. Mentors run Study Focus Groups in different discipline areas, on Monday evenings. You are welcome to call on the Mentors for advice, or you may join in a Study Focus Group for all the support it offers. Experienced students are another source of support in your subjects. The DRS Colleges are helpful kinds of places. Look out students on your floor, annexe or tower in your college who study the same subjects. They will be more than willing to help you.



The DRS also provides a fantastic textbook buying scheme to help you cope with the high cost of text books. Fill out the form at the CRL (Centre for Residential Life) and we can supply you with recommended texts, on loan. We encourage you to make the most of all the DRS residences have to offer.

In addition, the University has sources of academic support. Advisers of the Language and Academic Skills Units help students with their academic adjustment.

There is a Unit in each Faculty and a LAS ESL Unit in Humanities 3 Building, on the 4th floor. They are highly recommended. To find out more, ask the Centre for Residential Life Staff, or look it up on the University website.





Need food? Run out of Australian dollars? Hairdryer won't work because you haven't got a travel adapter? If any of these dilemmas sound familiar then you're likely to need the details and locations of La Trobe's local shopping centres and malls. The following shopping centres are within walking distance, accessible by tram or bus or a short drive in a friend's car.

Northland Shopping Centre

Features Coles and Safeway supermarkets. department stores including Myer and Kmart and various speciality stores. The best place to find adapters, convert currency or purchase clothes or beauty products. Travel by Bus No 550.

Bundoora Square & Aldi (Cheap but Great)

Located along the tram line (No 86, towards RMIT), this shopping centre has two supermarkets, several banks and various speciality stores including butchers and a bakery. The Aldi is located one stop prior to Bundoora Square and can be located across the road on the corner of Grimshaw Street and Plenty Road.

Summerhill Shopping Centre

Also located along the tram line (No 86), but in the opposite direction (towards the city), this little shopping area has a supermarket. A good place to stop on the way home from a day/ night in the city.

Internet Access



For those of you wanting to contact home once in Australia, free internet usage is provided at a once off charge. This provides you with up to 10 GB a month in downloads and is payable as part of your compulsory fees before you arrive. Access points are provided in every room (you will need your own computer). If you don't have a computer each college has their own computer labs with internet access.

The following are some light hearted Australian fun facts. An opportunity to learn some odd and interesting things about Australia.

- In 1838 it was declared illegal to swim at public beaches during the day! This law was enforced until 1902.
- Australia was the second country to give women the vote.
- Prime Minister Harold Holt went for a swim at Cheviot Beach, near Portsea on 17th December 1967, and was never seen again. The event has been referred to as 'the swim that needed no towel'.
- Australia day January 26, Australia day, is the anniversary of ships arriving in Sydney carrying a load of Convicts.
- Australia's first police force was a band of 12 of the most well behaved Convicts.
- Home of the deadliest snake -The Fierce Snake or Inland Taipan has the most toxic venom of any snake. Maximum yield recorded (for one bite) is 110mg. That would probably be enough to kill over 100 people or 250,000 mice.
- Emus and kangaroos cannot walk backwards, and are on the Australian coat of arms for that reason.
- A monotreme is a animal that lays eggs and suckles its young. The world's only monotremes are the platypus and the echidna.
- The male platypus has a poisonous spine that can kill a dog and inflict immense pain on a human.
- Box Jelly fish The box jellyfish is considered the world's most venomous marine creature. The box jellyfish has killed more people in Australia than stonefish, sharks and crocodiles combined.
- The Sydney Funnelweb spider is considered the world's most deadly spider. It is the only spider that has killed people in less than 2 hours. Its fangs are powerful enough to bite through gloves and fingernails. The only animals without immunity to the funnelweb's venom are humans and monkeys.
- The 'dingo fence' was built for the purpose of pest exclusion in Australia and is the longest fence in the world, it is about twice as long as the Great Wall of China.
- Dropbears are an evil species of koala that fall from trees and attack humans. This evil strain of koala doesn't actually exist. The story was created to fool Americans.
- Gambling Per Capita, Australians spend more money on gambling than any other nation. With less than 1 percent of the world's population, Australia has more than 20 percent of its poker machines.
- Per capita, Australians read more newspapers than any other nation.
- Urban dwellers Australia is one of the world's most urbanised countries, with about 70 per cent of the population living in the 10 largest cities .


